Introducing the SSA RAID Cluster Adapter for PC Servers, SSA, and RAID

The IBM SSA RAID Cluster Adapter for PC Servers is a Peripheral Component Interconnect (PCI) bus-master adapter that is used as the interface between systems that are using PCI architecture, and devices that are using Serial Storage Architecture (SSA). The adapter provides redundant array of independent disk (RAID) functions at RAID level 1. It can be configured in a cluster of two SSA RAID Cluster Adapters, where one SSA RAID Cluster Adapter is present in each of two PC Servers. (See "Clustering" on page 9 for more details.)

The adapter provides four SSA ports for the attachment of storage devices such as hard disk drives. Each port operates at 20MB/s full-duplex, and uses point-to-point copper cables that can be up to 25 meters long. SSA uses SCSI-2 commands, queuing model, status, and sense bytes; it is an industry-standard interface.

The adapter card has two pairs of SSA connectors, one pair (port 1 and port 2) for each SSA loop. Next to each pair of connectors is a light that functions as follows:

 The light is on continuously when power is turned on to the adapter and both ports for that loop are operational; that is, the devices connected next to the adapter in the loop have power turned on, are connected correctly to the adapter, and are operational.

- The light flashes continuously if one of the ports is not operational. Such a condition occurs if the cable to that port is not connected correctly, or if the device that is connected next to the adapter in the loop is not operational.
- The light is off if both ports are not operational.

Next to the SSA connectors and on one of the modules are labels on which is printed the 15-character SSA unique ID of the adapter.

A maximum of three adapters can be present in one system unit, if those adapters are all on the same bus.

CAUTION:

A lithium battery can cause fire, explosion, or a severe burn. Do not recharge, disassemble, heat above 100°C (212°F), solder directly to the cell, incinerate, or expose cell contents to water. The battery connector is polarized; do not try to reverse the polarity.

A module on the SSA RAID Cluster Adapter contains a lithium battery.

Operating System

The SSA RAID Cluster Adapter, its microcode, and the software that is supplied with it allow the attachment of SSA devices to servers that are running Microsoft Windows NT 4.0 Server or Microsoft Windows NT 4.0 Server/Enterprise Edition which includes Microsoft Cluster Server.

Serial Storage Architecture (SSA)

Serial Storage Architecture (SSA) is an industry-standard interface that provides high-performance fault-tolerant attachment of I/O storage devices. In SSA subsystems, transmissions to several destinations are multiplexed; the effective bandwidth is further increased by spatial reuse of the individual links. Commands are forwarded automatically from device to device along a loop until the target device is reached. Multiple commands can be travelling around the loop simultaneously. SSA retains the SCSI-2 commands, queuing model, and status and sense bytes.

SSA Loops, Links, and Data Paths

In the simplest SSA configuration, SSA devices are connected through two or more SSA links to an SSA adapter that is located in the system unit. The devices, SSA links, and SSA adapter are configured in loops. Each loop provides a data path that starts at one connector of the SSA adapter and passes through a link (SSA cable) to the devices. The loop continues through the devices, then returns through another link to a second connector on the SSA adapter. All devices that are attached to an SSA adapter card **1** are connected through SSA links **2**. The SSA links are configured as loops. Data and commands to a particular device pass through all other devices on the link between the adapter and the target device.

Data can travel in either direction round a loop. The adapter can, therefore, get access to the devices (disk drives in this example) through two data paths. The system cannot detect which data path is being used.



If a disk drive fails, or is turned off, the loop is broken, and one of the data paths to a particular disk drive is no longer available. The disk drives on the remains of the loop continue to work, but an error is reported to the system.

In the diagram, disk drive number 3 has failed. Disk drives 1 and 2 can communicate with the system only through connector A1 of the SSA adapter. Disk drives 4 through 8 can communicate only through connector A2 of the SSA adapter.



If two or more disk drives are turned off, fail, or are removed from the loop, some disk drives might become isolated from the SSA adapter.

In the diagram, disk drives 3 and 7 have been removed. Disk drives 1 and 2 can communicate with the system only through connector A1 of the SSA adapter. Disk drive number 8 can communicate with the system only through connector A2 of the SSA adapter. Disk drives 4, 5, and 6 are isolated from the SSA adapter.



Rules for SSA Loops

For SSA loops that include the SSA RAID Cluster Adapter, the following rules apply:

- Each SSA loop must be connected to valid pair of connectors on the adapter (that is, either connectors A1 and A2, or connectors B1 and B2).
- A maximum of two SSA loops can be connected to an SSA RAID Cluster Adapter.
- A maximum of two SSA RAID Cluster Adapters can be connected in a particular SSA loop.
- If two adapters are present in a particular SSA loop, both adapters must be SSA RAID Cluster Adapters.
- In a configuration that consists of two adapters and two SSA loops, both adapters must be SSA RAID Cluster Adapters, and both adapters must be connected to both SSA loops.
- In a configuration that consists of two SSA RAID Cluster Adapters and only one SSA loop, the spare pair of SSA connectors on each adapter must be

either not used, or connected to the spare connectors of the other adapter.

- Neither of the two servers in an SSA cluster can share disk drives with a third server.
 - One system must be designated system A; the other must be designated system B.
 - If multiple SSA RAID Cluster Adapters are installed in two systems that are sharing disk drives, the priority of the adapters in each loop must be the same for each system. For example, the first adapter in one system must be connected to the first adapter in the other system. (The adapters in a particular system are usually in slot-number sequence.)
 - A maximum of 48 devices can be connected in a particular SSA loop.

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- Under Microsoft Cluster Server, for a pair of servers, the total number of non-RAID disks and RAID-1 arrays can be up to 22. If no disk drives are configured as non-RAID disks, up to 44 disk drives can be configured as members of RAID-1 arrays, in addition to any disks that are configured as hot spares.
- Without Microsoft Cluster Server, for a pair of servers, up to 96 RAID-1 arrays can be configured; that is, up to 32 arrays on each of three pairs of adapters.
 - Member disks of an array can be on different loops.
 - The maximum permitted length for an external cable that connects two SSA nodes (for example, disk drives) is 25 meters (82 feet). If fiber optic cables and fibre-optic extenders are used, the link between two SSA nodes can be up to 2.4 km (7874 ft).

RAID Functions

Redundant Array of Independent Disks (RAID) technology provides immediate availability and recovery of data.

RAID technology stores data across groups of disk drives that are known as *arrays*. Subject to the level of RAID that you are using, this method of data storage provides the data redundancy that is needed for a secure system, and can allow faster retrieval of data through multiple channel access. Also, if a disk drive fails, it can normally be exchanged without interruption of normal system operation.

The arrays can provide data redundancy that ensures that no data is lost if one disk drive in the array fails. The method that is used to write data to an array is related to the level of RAID that is being used. Arrays are contained in array subsystems. Configurations can consist of one or more arrays.

The SSA RAID Cluster Adapter provides RAID 1 facilities, and allows access to SSA disk drives that are not configured as members of an array.

RAID Level 1

RAID level 1 is also known as mirroring or dual copy. It provides redundancy with better performance than a single disk, but requires real disk capacity of two times the data size.

A RAID 1 array has two disk drive members. If the members have different capacities, the resulting RAID 1 array has the capacity of the smaller member. Each data block of the array is written on each of the two members.

If one member fails, operations continue, to the good member. Performance is degraded for read operations, and improved for write operations, so a mixed workload might not show any change in overall performance. When a member returns or it is replaced (either manually or automatically by the hot-spare mechanism), a rebuilding operation occurs. This rebuilding operation is performed concurrently with any activity to the array.

Hot Spare Disk Drives

A hot-spare disk drive is a disk drive that is defined for automatic use if a disk drive in an array fails. The hot-spare disk drive must have a storage capacity that is greater than, or equal to, that of the smallest member of an array. You can define as many hot spare disk drives as you want. RAID 1 arrays can use hot-spare disk drives.

I If a disk drive in an array fails, after an interval, the adapter automatically uses a hot spare disk drive instead of the failed disk drive. The adapter rebuilds the data that was on the failed disk drive, and writes that rebuilt data onto the hot-spare disk drive.

Clustering

Two SSA RAID Cluster Adapters can be connected in one or two SSA loops that contain SSA disk drives. One SSA RAID Adapter is present in each of two PC Servers. Such an arrangement is called a cluster.

The two adapters of a cluster can provide support for up to 96 SSA disk drives (a maximum of 48 per loop). The disk drives can be configured as:

- Disk drives that are members of up to 32 RAID-1 arrays
- · Hot spare disk drives for the arrays
- · Disk drives that are not in arrays

The diagram shows an example configuration that has two loops.



How a Cluster Works

A cluster has two adapters, a primary adapter and a non-primary adapter. The primary adapter is the adapter that controls the RAID arrays.

When the cluster is first configured and the systems turned on, the adapter that has the higher SSA Unique ID is automatically defined to be the primary adapter. The SSA configuration provides an option that allows the user to define the other adapter to be the primary adapter, if required. All commands to the arrays, including commands from the non-primary adapter, are always routed to the primary adapter for processing. The performance of I/O operations to RAID 1 arrays is:

- Highest when the server that contains the primary adapter starts all the I/O operations.
- Lowest when the server that contains the non-primary adapter starts all the I/O operations.

All the arrays are reported to both systems. The system software determines which server communicates with which array.

Each adapter checks periodically that it can still communicate with its system. If it cannot communicate, it stops operating. The other adapter detects that the first adapter has stopped operating, and reconfigures the SSA network.

If the non-primary adapter detects that it has lost access to the other adapter across the SSA loop, the non-primary adapter becomes the primary adapter. Commands that were sent to the original primary adapter after access was lost are sent again, but this time, they are sent to the new primary adapter. This action is called *failover*.

If write operations are in progress to an array (or have occurred within the previous 20 seconds) when failover occurs, the array is rebuilt after the new primary adapter has taken control.

If an array has one of its members missing (that is, the
array is in the exposed or degraded state) when a failover
occurs, the status of the array becomes offline and an
error is logged. Manual intervention is needed to resolve
this error.

After a failover has occurred and a new adapter has been
installed in place of the faulty one, the new adapter might
have an SSA Unique ID that is higher than that of the
remaining (currently primary) adapter. Under that
condition, the new adapter becomes the primary adapter.
This action is called *failback*.

Disk Drives That Are Not in Arrays

Disk drives that are connected to an SSA RAID Cluster Adapter do not need to be members of an array. The SSA RAID Cluster Adapter handles such disk drives in the same way as a non-RAID adapter does. It transfers data directly between the disk drives and the system unit, and uses no RAID functions.

Access Modes

Note: Access modes have meaning only in SSA loops that contain multiple adapters.

Disk drives that are not members of an array can be in any one of the following access modes, which are selectable from the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility (see "Changing the Access Mode" on page 55). The access modes for the disk drives of both systems in the cluster can be changed through the adapter of either system. The adapter is selected from the SSA Adapter List of the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility. In the following definitions, the term "this adapter" means the adapter that has been selected from the SSA Adapter List.

Public	System access is available to this resource through <i>both</i> adapters in the loop.	
Local	System access is available to this resource only through <i>this</i> adapter.	
Private	System access is <i>not</i> available to this resource through this adapter.	
No Access	System access is not available to this resource through <i>either</i> adapter in the loop.	
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Arrays are in Public mode. Their mode cannot be changed.

Public mode is the default mode.

If a system is to be booted from an SSA disk, the access mode of the boot disk must be local when viewed through the adapter that is installed in that system.

Disk Numbers

A disk number is assigned to a disk drive, or to an array, when the SSA configurator attaches that disk drive, or array, to the system. (That is, the disk drive, or array, becomes a system resource.)

The number that is assigned is related to the position in the System Resource List at which the resource (disk drive or array) is attached. The SSA configurator provides an option that allows the user to change the disk number to another number, if required. Valid numbers are 1 through 255.

Disk numbers are similar to the SCSI ID settings on SCSI disk drives. The system software uses the disk numbers to map the disk drives to a logical bus, target, and LUN.

The logical bus number to which a system resource is mapped is:

Disk number divided by 32

where 32 is the number of targets on each bus.

| Therefore, a disk number that is lower than 32 is mapped | to logical bus 0.

The target address is the remainder that results from dividing the disk number by 32.

For example:

Disk Number	Mapping
2	Logical Bus 0 Target 2
32	Logical Bus 1 Target 0
37	Logical Bus 1 Target 5
65	Logical Bus 2 Target 1

| The device is always mapped to LUN 0.

Service Request Numbers (SRNs)

Service request numbers (SRNs) are generated by the system error-log analysis, system configuration code, diagnostics, and customer problem-determination procedures. SRNs help you to identify the cause of a problem, the failing field-replaceable units (FRUs), and the service actions that might be needed to solve the problem.

The SRN Table

The table in this section lists the SRNs and describes the actions you should do. The table columns are:

SRN	The service reference number.	
FRU list	The FRU or FRUs that might be causing the problem, and how likely it is (by percentage) that the FRU is causing the problem.	
Problem	A description of the problem and the action you must take.

Using the SRN Table

- Important: You should have been sent here from either diagnostics or a START MAP. Do not start problem determination from the SRN table; always go to the START MAP for the unit in which the device is installed.
 - Locate the SRN in the table. *If you cannot find the SRN*, refer to the documentation for the subsystem or device. If you still cannot find the SRN, you have a problem with the diagnostics, the microcode, or the documentation. Call your support center for assistance.
 - 2. Read carefully the "Action" you must do for the problem. *Do not exchange adapters unless you are instructed to do so.*
 - Normally exchange only one adapter at a time. Always use instructions provided with the system unit when exchanging adapters. After each adapter is exchanged, go to "MAP 2410: SSA Repair Verification" on page 2410-1 to verify the repair.

Software and Microcode Errors

Some SRNs indicate that a problem might have been caused by a software error or by a microcode error. If you have one of these SRNs, do the following actions:

- 1. Make a note of the contents of the error log for the device that has the problem.
- Go to the system service aids and select **Display** Vital Product Data to display the VPD of the failing system. Make a note of the VPD for all the SSA adapters and disk drives.
- 3. Report the problem to your support center. The center can tell you whether you have a known problem, and can, if necessary, provide you with a correction for the software or microcode.

SSA Loop Configurations that Are Not Valid

The SRNs that send you to this section indicate an SSA loop or configuration that is not valid. The description for your particular SRN might provide additional information. "Rules for SSA Loops" on page 6 shows how many devices and adapters can be contained in an SSA loop.

If the SRN occurred when you, or the customer, turned on the system:

- 1. Turn off the system.
- 2. Review the configuration that you are trying to make, and determine why that configuration is not valid.
- Correct your configuration by reconfiguring the SSA cables or by removing the excess devices or adapters from the loop.
- 4. Turn on the system.

If the SRN occurred because additional devices or adapters were added to a working SSA loop:

- 1. Remove the additional devices or adapters that are causing the problem, and put the loop back into its original, working configuration.
 - **Note:** It is important that you do these actions, because they enable the configuration code to reset itself from the effects of the error.
- 2. Review the configuration that you are trying to make, and determine why that configuration is not valid.
- Correct your configuration by reconfiguring the SSA cables or by removing the excess devices or adapters from the loop.

SSA Maintenance Analysis Procedures (MAPs)

The maintenance analysis procedures (MAPs) describe how to analyze a failure that has occurred in an SSA loop.

How to Use the MAPs

Attention: Unless the system unit needs to be turned off for some other reason, *do not turn off the system when servicing an SSA loop*. Unit power cables and external SSA cables that connect the devices to the system can be disconnected while that system is running.

- To isolate the FRUs, do the actions and answer the questions given in the MAPs.
- When instructed to exchange two or more FRUs in sequence:
 - 1. Exchange the first FRU in the list for a new one.
 - Verify that the problem is solved. For some problems, verification means running the diagnostic programs.
 - 3. If the problem remains:
 - a. Reinstall the original FRU.
 - b. Exchange the next FRU in the list for a new one.
 - Repeat steps 2 and 3 until either the problem is solved, or all the related FRUs have been exchanged.
 - 5. Do the next action indicated by the MAP.

Attention: Disk drives are fragile. Handle them with care, and keep them well away from strong magnetic fields.

SSA Link Errors

SSA link errors can be caused if:

- An SSA device is failing
- An SSA device is removed
- A cable is disconnected.

Such errors might be indicated by:

- SRN 45PAA
- A flashing link status (Ready) light on the SSA device at each end of the failing link
- The indication of an open link by the Disk Service Aid.

SSA Link Error Problem Determination

Instead of using the normal MAPs to solve a link error problem, you can refer directly to the link status lights to isolate the failing FRU. The descriptions given here show you how to do this.

In an SSA loop, SSA devices are connected through two or more SSA links to an SSA RAID Cluster Adapter. Each SSA link is the connection between two SSA nodes (devices or adapters); for example:

- Disk drive to disk drive
- Adapter to disk drive module
- Adapter to adapter

An SSA link can contain several parts. When doing problem determination, think of the link and all its parts as one complete item.

Here are some examples of SSA links. Each link contains more than one part.

Example 1

This link is between two disk drives that are in the same subsystem. It has three parts.



Example 2

This link is between two disk drives that are in the same subsystem. It has five parts.



Example 3

This link is between two disk drives that are not in the same subsystem. It has seven parts.



Example 4

This link is between a disk drive and an SSA RAID Cluster Adapter. It has five parts.



Link Status Lights on the Adapter

If a fault occurs that prevents the operation of a particular link, the link status lights of the various parts of the complete link show that the error has occurred.

You can find the failing link by looking for the flashing green status light at each end of the affected link. Some configurations might have other indicators along the link (for example, SSA connector cards) to help with FRU isolation.

The meanings of the disk drive and adapter lights are summarized here.

Status of Light	Meaning
Off	Both SSA links are inactive.
Permanently on	Both SSA links are active.
Slow flash (two seconds on, two seconds off)	Only one SSA link is active.

- For other lights, the service information for the device that contains the lights.

SSA Service Aids

SSA service aids are included in the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility. The SSA service aids are:

- Set Service Mode: This service aid enables you to determine the location of a particular disk drive on the SSA loop, and to remove that disk drive from the loop.
- Format Disk: This service aid formats an SSA disk drive.
- **Certify Disk:** This service aid verifies that all the data on a disk drive can be read correctly.

Attention: Do not run the service aids from more than one system at a time; otherwise, unexpected results might occur.

These service aids are available only from the Disk Service Aids menu. To start a service aid, press the appropriate function (F) key. The assignments for the F keys are shown on the screen.

Before you use the service aids, ensure that you are familiar with the principles of SSA loops. If you are not familiar with these principles, first read "SSA Loops, Links, and Data Paths" on page 3.

Set Service Mode Service Aid

The Set Service Mode service aid enables you to determine the location of a particular disk drive, and to remove that disk drive from the unit in which it is installed. When the Set Service Mode service aid runs:

- The Check light of the disk drive comes on for identification.
- All SSA loop activity through the disk drive stops.
- The disk drive motor stops.
- The Check light (if present) of the unit that contains the selected disk drive comes on.

Only one disk drive at a time can be in Service Mode, and that disk drive must be one that is listed as a new resource or as a free resource. No communication to the disk drive is possible, and the SSA loop is broken.

Before using this service aid, you must make the selected disk drive unavailable to the system; otherwise, an error occurs.

SSA devices can be maintained concurrently; that is, they can be removed, installed, and tested on an SSA loop while the other devices on the loop continue to work normally. If a disk drive has its Check light on, you can remove that disk drive from the SSA loop without taking any special actions.

If a disk drive does *not* have its Check light on, the SSA loop that passes through it might still be active, although the disk drive itself might not be working. You must put that disk drive into Service Mode before you remove it from the SSA loop.

If you leave the Disk Service Aids window, Service Mode is reset.

If the Check light of the disk drive that you have put into Service Mode does not come on, and you are not sure of the location of that disk drive, use the Identify function to help you find it (see "The Identify Function" on page 45). If necessary, you can identify the disk drives that are on each side of the one that you are trying to find.
- 5 To reset Service Mode, press Esc.

Format Disk Service Aid

The Format Disk service aid formats SSA disk drives. Only disk drives that are listed as new resources or as free resources can be formatted.

Attention: Formatting a disk drive destroys all the data on that disk drive. Use this procedure only when instructed to do so by the service procedures.

To use the Format Disk service aid:

1 Start the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility, and select **Disk Service Aids** (see "Selecting SSA Service Aids" on page 38)

The Disk Service Aids window is displayed:



- 2 From the Disk Service Aids window, select the disk drive that you want to format.
- **3** If you are not sure of the identification of the disk drive that you want to format, use the Identify function to get a positive physical identification of the disk drive (see "The Identify Function" on page 45). You can further ensure that you have selected the correct disk drive by verifying that the serial number on the disk drive is the same as the serial number that is displayed on the screen.

4 When you are sure that you have selected the correct disk drive, press F2 (Format). A prompt for confirmation is displayed:

Certify Disk Service Aid

The Certify service aid verifies that all the data on a disk drive can be read correctly. Other maintenance procedures tell you when you need to run this service aid.

To use the Certify Disk service aid:

1 Start the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility, and select **Disk Service Aids** (see "Selecting SSA Service Aids" on page 38)

- **4** When you are sure that you have selected the correct disk drive, press F3 (Certify).
- 5 If you want to find out how the certify operation is progressing, look at the resource attributes (see "Viewing Resources and Their Attributes" on page 77).
The Identify Function

The Identify function can be accessed from most of the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility displays.

This function enables you to determine the location of a particular disk drive that you want to identify, but do not want to remove. Identify causes the Check light of the disk drive to flash for identification (two seconds on, two seconds off), but has no effect on the normal operation of the disk drive. It also causes the Check light (if present) of the unit containing the selected disk drive to flash. You can use the Identify function on any number of disk drives at the same time.

Instructions displayed by the service aids tell you when you can select the Identify function.

The service aids display the UIDs of the devices. By checking the UID on the serial-number label on the device, you can verify that the correct device has its Check light flashing.

To start the Identify function, press F9 (FlashOn). To end the Identify function, press F10 (FlashOff).

Download Microcode Function

Instructions on how to download microcode are contained in a README.TEXT file that is on the diskette supplied with the adapter.

Finding the Physical Location of a Device

The physical location of a device (for example, a disk drive or an SSA RAID Cluster Adapter) cannot be reported directly by the system because of the way in which the SSA interface works. The address of an SSA device is related to the position of that device on the SSA loop. The address can, therefore, change if the configuration is changed.

Finding the Device When Service Aids Are Available

When the service aids are available, use the Identify function to find the correct disk drive (see "The Identify Function" on page 45). If you want to find a device that does not have a Check light (for example, an adapter), you can either use the Identify function to identify devices that are next to the SSA RAID Cluster Adapter on the SSA link, or use the procedure described in "Finding the Device When No Service Aids Are Available."

Finding the Device When No Service Aids Are Available

When no service aids are available, you must find the device by using the port (P) and SSA-address (AA) values that are provided by some service request numbers (SRNs). Examples of these SRNs are 43PAA, 44PAA, and 45PAA.

The port (P) value can be a number 0 through 3. It indicates the port connector on the SSA adapter:

- 0 = Connector A1
- 1 = Connector A2
- 2 = Connector B1
- 3 = Connector B2

The AA value is the decimal SSA-address value. It indicates the position of the device that you are trying to find (counted *along* the SSA loop).

Use the port value to locate the relevant connector on the SSA RAID Cluster Adapter, then follow the SSA cable to the first *real* device. Include other adapters as real devices if they are in the same SSA link. Do not include dummy devices.

The first device that you reach represents SSA-address count 0. Continue to follow the SSA links from device to device, increasing the SSA-address count by 1 for each device, until you reach the device that is indicated in the SRN.

The Event/Error Logger Utility

The adapter software includes an Event/Error Logger utility. This utility is automatically loaded into the system during the installation of the adapter software, and afterward, at each power-on operation. It collects information about SSA errors, and tells you when an error occurs that needs a service action.

All errors are reported and logged in the Event/Error Log files of **both** cluster members.

The format in which the Event/Error Logger reports errors is controlled by the file xxxxx.yyy in zzzzzzz. Details of the settings and how to change them are contained in the header of the control file.

The SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility provides functions that allow you to use the logged information. These functions are:

- Analyze SSA Event Log
- Problem Fix Procedure
- Dump SSA Event Log
- Terminate SSA Event Log
- Modify SSA Event Logger Time Out.

Analyze SSA Event Log

This function checks the log information that has been collected over the previous twenty-four hours, and displays information about errors that require service actions to be done.

Service Actions are indicated by service request numbers (SRNs): see "Service Request Numbers (SRNs)" on page 13.

Note: The Analyze Log function does not recommend a service action for every log entry. Not all log entries require a service action. In some

conditions, some errors might be related to operational procedures. Such errors do not require service actions.

Attention: If you need to do any service actions, always go first to "MAP 2010: START" on page 2010-1.

Problem Fix Procedure

When you have solved a problem, you must flag all the errors that are related to that problem. Otherwise, the next time that you run the Analyze SSA Event Log function, or diagnostics, another SRN might be created for the problem, which no longer exists.

To flag an error, select the error from the Error Log Report screen (see "Analyze SSA Event Log" on page 47), then press the Delete key.

Dump SSA Event Log

This function translates, and writes to a text file, the contents of the Event/Error Log. You can use any text display to look at the text file.

Note: Not all log entries require a service action. In some conditions, some errors might be related to operational procedures. Such errors do not require service actions.

Terminate SSA Event Log

This function ends the operations of the event/error logger.

To restart the logger, either use the icon that is normally in the STARTUP group folder, or go to the directory that contains the ISSAELOG.EXE file.

Modify Event Logger Time Out

This function enables you to set a longer time for the event logger to perform the analyze and dump functions. A heavily-loaded system might cause a time out to occur if the time setting is too short.

Using the SSA Configurator Functions

The functions of the SSA configurator are included in the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility that is provided on the SSA RAID Adapter diskette for your operating system.

The diagram summarizes functions of the SSA configurator.



You must use the SSA configurator to configure and attach SSA disk drives; otherwise, the operating system cannot use those disk drives. You do not need to run this configurator if you are configuring and attaching other types of device.

Array States

An array can be in one of the following states:

Good

The array is online and it can be read and written. Both
member disk drives of the array are present. No data
rebuilding is outstanding. The array is fully protected
against the loss of one member.

Exposed State

One member is missing from the array. The first write operation causes the array to enter the degraded state.

After an interval, if a hot spare is available, it replaces the missing member and the array enters the rebuilding state.

Degraded State

One member is missing and a write operation has been
received for the array. Read and write operations to the
array are supported. If a hot spare disk drive is available,
after an interval, the hot spare replaces the missing
member and the array enters the rebuilding state.

| The missing member is permanently excluded from the | array.

Rebuilding State

The array is online and it can be read and written. Bothmembers of the array are present but data is being rebuilton one of the members.

Offline State

An array is in this state when one of the following conditions exists:

- · Both members of the array are missing or have failed.
- One member of the array is missing when a failover occurs.
- The rebuilding of a replacement member is not complete when the remaining original member fails.

| Read and write operations to the array are not supported.

Starting the SSA Configurator Functions

1 If the operating system is running, start the SSA Configurator and Service Aids Utility by selecting the icon that was generated when the software was installed, or by running the ISSACFG program.

If the operating system is not running, run the stand-alone DOS SSA Configuration Utility (ISSACFG).

Setting the Primary Adapter

By default, the adapter that has the higher SSA Unique ID is defined to be the primary adapter. The performance of I/O operations to RAID-1 arrays is:

- Highest when the server that contains the primary adapter starts all the I/O operations
- Lowest when the server that contains the non-primary adapter starts all the I/O operations.

To improve the performance of the system, you might choose to define the other adapter as the primary adapter. To do this:

- **9** Exit the configurator, shutdown your system, and reboot. The reboot enables the system to recognize the devices that you have added to the list of system resources.
- **10** The SSA subsystem is now ready for use with your system.
- **11** Ensure that the event/error logger has been started.

If you need to start the event/error logger, either use the icon that is normally in the STARTUP group folder, or go to the directory that contains the ISSAELOG.EXE file.

 - Let the replacement disk drive be a permanent member disk drive in the array, and convert the rejected disk drive into a hot spare disk drive:

 - b. Convert the free resource disk drive into a hot spare disk drive (see "Creating an Array or a Hot Spare Disk Drive" on page 58).
