To ensure your personal safety and protect your equipment and data, carefully read the information that follows the *Features* list before you begin installing.

Tools required

- An ESD grounding strap or mat
- Standard hand tools to open your system's case and install the Escalade Storage Switch into an available PCI expansion slot.

System requirements

The Escalade Storage Switch requires a workstation-class or server-class CPU whose bus complies with PCI 2.1 standards, and a PCI slot that meets the Plug and Play and PC99 specifications. The storage switch requires one full-size PCI-bus slot. It may be connected to up to two, four or eight IDE/ATA drives by the supplied 40-pin, 80-conductor ribbon interface cables.

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Note: The blue end of the ribbon interface cable plugs into the Escalade Storage Switch and the black end plugs into the drive.

Drives must meet UltraATA-100, UltraATA-66 or UltraATA-33 standards, but may be of any capacity or physical form factor. Length of unshielded interface cables may not exceed 18" (45.7 cm).

Personal safety



Warning! High voltages may be found inside computer equipment. Before installing any of the hardware in this package or removing the protective covers of any computer equipment, turn off power switches and disconnect power cords. Do not reconnect the power cords until you have replaced the covers.

Protecting equipment and data



Back up your data! Creating or deleting disk arrays destroys existing files on the member drives. If your drives contain valuable data, back them up and save data elsewhere before changing your array configuration.

ESD precautions

Standard electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions must be followed to avoid damaging computer components and accessories when installing or removing the Escalade Storage Switch.

- When the case of your computer is open and its internal parts are exposed, don't touch any internal part unnecessarily.
- Always wear a grounded strap or work on an ESD-protective mat.
- Don't remove the storage switch from its protective bag until you are properly grounded.
- Handle the storage switch by its edges or by the black rail and metal bracket at its two ends.
- Don't touch any pin, contact, lead or component on the storage switch.

Mechanical concerns

Be careful when installing the Escalade Storage Switch into your system. Excessive force can damage the board, the cables, your drives or your system.

- Be sure the board is aligned with its slot on the motherboard before installing. Do not flex the board excessively.
- Interface cable connectors must be mated carefully without bending any pins. The connectors provided are keyed to prevent you from inserting them upside-down.

- The blue end of the interface cable plugs into the board and the black end plugs into the drive.
- Interface cables are fragile and must not be crimped or pinched. Ensure that they do not impede the flow of cooling air from fans or heat sinks in the system case.

Introduction

Escalade Storage Switches allow you to use low-cost IDE/ATA drives in your storage system and still achieve performance levels and fault tolerance capabilities typically found in more expensive SCSI systems. Escalade Storage Switches are available as two, four or eight port configurations, as well as a shortened four or eight port versions designed for higher density rack-mounted applications.

StorSwitch[™] architecture for scalable performance

The StorSwitch Architecture, found only in 3ware products, accelerates your storage system's performance by speeding data into system memory. Each drive has its own dedicated AccelerATA data IDE port, maximizing drive and system throughput.

RAID increases performance and adds redundancy

Escalade Storage Switches use Redundant Array of Inexpensive Disks (RAID) to increase your storage system's performance and provide fault tolerance. The storage switches offer RAID 0 variable striped arrays for performance; RAID 1 mirrored arrays for fault tolerance; variable striped mirrored RAID 10 arrays for fault tolerance and performance; and RAID 5 arrays for fault tolerance, high capacity and storage efficiency.

RAID 0 arrays maximize performance and capacity

When drives are configured in a striped disk array (see Figure 1), the Escalade Storage Switch distributes large files across the multiple disks using RAID 0 techniques. Striped disk arrays achieve high transfer rates because they can read or write data on more than one drive simultaneously. Striped disk arrays give exceptional performance, particularly for data intensive applications such as video editing, computer aided design and geographical information systems. Striping your disk array concatenates each drive's capacity into one large volume. The stripe size is user configurable at 64K, 128K, 256K, 512K or 1M.

RAID 1 arrays offer fault tolerance

Mirrored disk arrays write data to two drives using RAID 1 algorithms (see Figure 2). This gives your system fault tolerance by preserving the data on one drive if the other drive fails. Fault tolerance is a basic requirement for mission critical systems like web and database servers.

$\mathsf{TwinStor}^{\mathsf{TM}}$ Technology adds performance to 3ware's mirrored disk arrays

Traditional mirroring techniques do little to improve performance. The adaptive algorithms found in 3ware's TwinStor technology boost performance by distinguishing between random and sequential read requests. For the sequential requests generated when accessing large files, both drives are used, with the heads simultaneously reading alternating sections of the file. For the smaller random transactions, the data is read from a single optimal drive head.

Drives can be dynamically profiled, specifically for your brand of drive, during installation to customize the stripe size (for RAID configurations offering variable striping) and seek algorithms.

RAID 10 arrays maximize performance and fault tolerance

When drives are configured as a striped mirrored array, the disks are configured using both RAID 0 and RAID 1 techniques, thus the name RAID 10 (see Figure 3). A minimum of four drives are required to use this technique. The first two drives are mirrored as a fault tolerant array using RAID 1. The third and fourth drives are mirrored as a second fault tolerant array using RAID 1. The two mirrored arrays are then grouped as a striped RAID 0 array using a two tier structure. Higher data transfer rates are achieved by leveraging TwinStor and striping (64K, 128K, 256K, 512K or 1M) the arrays. RAID 10 is available on the four and eight port Escalade Storage Switches.

RAID 5 arrays optimize performance, fault tolerance, high capacity and storage efficiency

The RAID 5 configuration features the data striping of RAID 0 combined with the parity of RAID 4. Using a simple parity (exclusive OR) function, RAID 5 can tolerate the loss of one drive. Parity information is distributed across all drives rather than being concentrated on a single disk (see Figure 4). This avoids throughput loss due to contention for the parity drive. You can use hot spares to rebuild a failed drive "on-the-fly".

RAID 5 capacity = size of smallest drive \times (number of drives - 1). In addition, the array's storage efficiency increases with the number of disks; from 66.7 % for 3 drives to 87.5 % for 8 drives: storage efficiency = (number of drives -1) \div (number of drives).

Unlike all other RAID configurations that offer data striping, except for RAID 1, RAID 5 stripe size is limited to 64k.

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Note: BIOS will reject the creation of a RAID 5 array having less than 3 drives.

R5 FusionTM Technology significantly improves RAID 5 write performance

3ware's R5 Fusion significantly improves RAID 5 write performance for both large sequential and small random transactions. This advanced block caching firmware technology is combined with StorSwitch to deliver extremely high performance for RAID 5 write operations.



Note: R5 Fusion is available only with Escalade 7450 and 7850 storage switches.

Background Media Scan and Dynamic Sector Repair enhance data integrity

Background Media Scan is an embedded feature that performs a read-scan of all disks in an array. An error notification is posted for each read error detected (see "Screen Display Messages" on page 145). If the array is redundant (i.e., RAID 1, 10 and 5) Dynamic Sector Repair automatically recovers the redundant data and rewrites it to the logical defective location. The drive reallocates the sector where the read error occurred and a notification of repair is posted. This results in the restoration of drive and data integrity; the primary and redundant data are again both valid.

Configure and manage your disk arrays

The **3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility** is a BIOS level tool for creating, deleting, maintaining disk arrays and rebuilding mirrored arrays. From the **3DM Disk Array Configuration Utility**, you can also specify hot spares from available drives to be dynamically substituted for a failed drive in a mirrored array. Refer to the *3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility* chapter.

SMART Monitoring (Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology) adds monitoring and troubleshooting functionality by

automatically checking a disk drive's health and reporting potential problems. It allows you to take proactive steps to prevent impending disk crashes.

3DM Disk Management Utility runs in the background on the Escalade Storage Switch's host and allows you to monitor the switch and rebuild mirrored arrays remotely via a standard web browser. To remotely access 3DM, you are not required to install any software on your system but you must have access to the network with the Escalade Storage Switch. 3DM supports hot spare and hot swap for mirrored arrays. Hot swap allows users to replace a failed drive in a mirrored array while the system remains up. Refer to the *3DM Disk Management Utility* chapter.

To create, delete or verify arrays, you must use the **3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility**. To check array configuration or status, disable write cache, select a hot spare or rebuild a mirrored array, you can use the **3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility** at BIOS time or **3DM Disk Management Utility** in real time. Hot swap is only available through the **3DM Disk Management Utility**.

Quick Installation Guide



* This process does not interfere with the installation of 3DM or the use of the array.

Step 1. Install the Escalade Storage Switch

Install the two, four or eight port Escalade Storage Switch in an available PCI slot. Slots closest to the Accelerated Graphics Port give the best performance. The blue end of the ribbon interface cable must be connected to the storage switch and the black end must be connected to the drive.

Step 2. Create Arrays

Verify your boot device precedes the Escalade Storage Switch in the boot sequence, then press **Alt-3** to activate the **3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility** at boot time. Specify RAID arrays and hot spares.

Step 3. Install System Drivers

The Escalade Storage Switch drivers must be installed according to the type of installation and the operating system. Installations include:

- Installing the storage switch while installing the operating system.
- Installing the storage switch on systems that boot from a different device.
- Replacing an existing storage switch with a new version of the switch.

Operating systems supporting the Escalade Storage Switch include:

- Windows NT 4.0
- Windows 98 SE or ME
- Windows XP
- Windows 2000
- Red Hat Linux
- SuSE Linux

Step 4. RAID Array Background Initialization Process

The completion of the system driver installation will start the RAID array initialization process. This process may take several hours, but it does not interfere with the installation of 3DM or the use of the array.

Step 5. Install 3DM

Install 3DM for Windows or Linux from the 3DM installation CD-ROM.

Windows

a:\setup from Run... in the Start menu.

Linux

mount /dev/hdc /mnt

cd /mnt

./install.3dm

Answer questions concerning e-mail notification and the port number for WEB monitoring.

cd /

umount /mnt

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Note: When specifying multiple e-mail addresses for notification, separate e-mail addresses using a comma.

Hardware Installation

Figure 5 shows ports and connectors on the Escalade 7850 Storage Switch.

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Warning: Before proceeding with hardware installation, read the *Before You Begin* section completely that describes personal and system precautions. Failing to do so may result in personal injury or damage to your computer or the Escalade Storage Switch.

To remove an existing Escalade Storage Switch

- 1 If the computer is running, shut it down. Turn off power to the computer and disconnect the power cord from the outlet.
- 2 Open the computer case according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- 3 Disconnect the disks from the existing Escalade Storage Switch installed in your system. If your boot disk is connected to the storage switch and you intend to retain it as your boot device, note or mark which physical disk is connected to slot 0 on the switch. This disk should be reconnected to slot 0 on the new storage switch. Preserving the slot order of how the other drives are connected is unimportant, even if the disks are part of a disk array, although it is recommended that a plug-to-plug replacement is followed.
- 4 Remove the screw in the metal bracket at the end of the old storage switch. Save the screw for installing the new switch.
- 5 Gently remove the storage switch from the PCI slot.
- 6 Remove the cables from the storage switch and discard. Reusing interface cables is not recommended.

Connect the interface cables to the Escalade Storage Switch

1 Connect the interface cables supplied with the product to the storage switch.

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Note: UltraATA-66 and UltraATA-100 drives require 40-pin, 80-conductor ribbon cables. These cables have color coded ends. For optimum performance, the blue end must be connected to the storage switch and the black end must be connected to the hard drive.

2 One edge of each interface cable should have a colored (usually red) line denoting the conductor to Pin 1. Align the storage

switch so that the colored line is toward the top edge of the switch. Mate the connectors carefully without bending any pins.

3 Install the other connectors in the same manner.

Install the Escalade Storage Switch in the computer

- 1 If the computer is running, shut it down. Turn off power to the computer and disconnect the power cord from the outlet.
- 2 Open the computer case according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- 3 Find the PCI slot you want to use for the storage switch.



Hint: Cable routing may be easier if you install the storage switch next to an open slot.

4 Remove the metal filler bracket for the slot. Save this screw; it will be used to secure the storage switch after you have seated it in the slot.



Hint: While the storage switch runs properly in any PCI slot, not all slots give equal performance due to the architecture of the PCI bus. In our laboratories, we have noticed that the slots closest to the Accelerated Graphics Port (AGP) typically give the best performance.

5 Line the storage switch up so that all pins make proper contact with the PCI slot pins when pushed into place. The black end rail opposite the metal bracket may be removed if needed to fit the storage switch inside the chassis. The short 4-port or 8-port Escalade Storage Switch is keyed to ensure proper installation in a full-sized PCI slot.

- 6 Ensure that the contacts will mate with both grooves in the slot. Press down gently on the edge of the storage switch directly above the slot until the it is fully seated.
- 7 Check that the storage switch's metal bracket covers the hole in the case and secure the bracket with the screw that was used to secure the filler bracket in step 4.

Connect the drives to the interface cables

- 1 Be sure to use the supplied cables. With the higher speeds of UltraATA-100 and UltraATA-66, using quality cables is important.
- 2 Before connecting your drives, check your drives' jumper setting. The range of settings provided vary by manufacturer as do the method for adjusting them. Refer to information provided with your drives for the method required to set them. To operate properly, the Escalade Storage Switch requires that drives be set as **Single** (if available on your drive) or **Master**.
- 3 If your drives are not already installed in the computer chassis, do so now. Be sure that the drives are connected to the power supply. Y-splitter power supply connectors are included in some kits in case you need additional power supply connections.
- 4 For each drive, select the black end of an interface cable not connected to the storage switch and plug it into the drive or drive carrier. The cable's colored edge denotes Pin 1 and should be adjacent to the 4-pin power plug.

Check your installation and close the case

- 1 After all of the drives are connected to the storage switch and it is installed in its slot, verify that the cables do not interfere with the operation of any other components in the case or block the flow of cooling air.
- 2 Close the case and reconnect the power cables.

Check motherboard boot sequence

Using your computer's Setup utility, ensure that your boot device precedes the Escalade Storage Switch in the boot sequence. If you have other disks installed on the motherboard, the storage switch precedes them in boot order.



3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility

The 3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility allows you to create disk arrays by combining disks, deleting disks or breaking disk arrays back into their member disks. You can also specify an available drive as a hot spare. If an array becomes degraded, the hot spare will automatically be substituted for the faulted drive.

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Note: The BIOS will not be installed if no drives are attached to the Escalade Storage Switch. The storage switch shares one IRQ on the PCI bus.

Hot Spare and Hot Swap

Hot Spare is the label given to a drive that is available, active and designated as a spare. This designated drive is applied automatically when a drive degrades and the array is rebuilt. *Hot Swap* is the term applied to the process of swapping out a degraded drive, programmatically and using 3DM, with a pre-assigned spare.

There are two methods for adding a drive as a spare. You may designate a drive as a Hot Spare during the BIOS page display, or you may designate a drive as a Hot Spare through the 3DM configure page. These two methods are discussed below.

BIOS Screen

When designating spare in the BIOS screen, it is assumed that as you are creating your array, you are "setting aside" drive(s) as Hot Spares. This is done by using the S key on the selected drive. Leaving a drive undesignated results in it becoming a JBOD drive. JBOD drives become available to the operating system as distinct volumes, and, consequently, they cannot be designated as spares at a later time. If a spare is designated in the BIOS screen, the designation and configuration is in effect from this point on. The spare drive will be displayed as a Hot Spare in the 3DM configuration page.

3DM Configure Page

In order to designate an available drive as a spare from the 3DM configure page, you must ensure that the drive is not a JBOD drive. To designate a drive as a Hot Spare from this page, you must use one of the two following methods:

- 1 Install the drive at the operating system level while the system is powered. This should only be done with an approved and recognized drive-carrier swap. If you do not use an approved and recognized drive-carrier swap, connecting interface cables and power cables can/will crash the system from bus or power supply issues.
- 2 Shut down the system (Windows/Linux system shutdown); install the drive and do not go into the BIOS screen. When 3DM is invoked, the configuration page may show this drive as dead. Select Issue a Removed Drive and then select Add Spare. The drive should appear as a Hot Spare.

Invoking the 3ware BIOS tool

Reboot your system. During the boot phase, wait until you see a screen similar to Figure 6.

Press Alt-3 immediately to bring up the 3ware Disk Array Configuration display.

Note: If drives are attached and you do not want to install the 3ware BIOS, press **Alt-b** to bypass the BIOS installation.

Exiting the 3ware BIOS tool

To save your configuration modifications hit the **F8** key. After you have hit the **F8** key to commit your changes, a list of affected drives will be displayed and you will be asked to confirm your configuration. The booting process will resume. If you have selected mirrored arrays after the operating system is running, the Escalade Storage Switch will automatically run a background initialization to verify that both disks in the arrays are identical.

To exit the 3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility without saving your changes hit **Esc**.

Determining your configuration



Caution: Configuring a disk array writes format-type data onto its member disks and overwrites all the files on those disks. Be sure to back up data that requires retention.

With a 2-port Escalade Storage Switch you are limited to a twodrive JBOD (Just a Bunch of Disks), or a two-drive RAID 0 or RAID 1 array. With a 4-port Escalade Storage Switch, you can combine two to four disks into a single array. With four disks you can create a four-drive RAID 0 array, two RAID 1 arrays, one RAID 5 array or one RAID 10 array.

The 4-port configuration can be duplicated using the 8-port Escalade Storage Switch. In addition, you may also create a five, six, seven or eight-drive RAID 0 or RAID 5 array, or an eight-drive RAID 10 array.

The **3ware Disk Array Configuration** main display shows the current disk drive configuration.

- Available Drives reports independent drives (JBOD) not associated with an array.
- **Disk Arrays** lists any existing arrays along with their member disks and hot spares.

Throughout the utility (see Figure 7) use the **Up and Down** arrow keys to navigate, **Enter** to select the disks or buttons and **F1** for context sensitive help. **Toggle Hot Spare** verbiage is black when the cursor is over a drive that can be specified as a hot spare and gray when hot spare cannot be specified. If you've made mistakes and want to start over, pressing **F6** will return your starting values. Pressing **Escape** will exit the configuration utility as well as abandon your changes. Pressing **F8** will save your changes and exit the utility.

Displaying advance details

Selecting **Shift-F5** will show the software versions (BIOS, Firmware, monitor) and slot # of the 3ware card (see Figure 8). Press **Escape** to return to the main 3ware Disk Array Configuration screen.

Creating a disk array

To create an array, first select the drives to be included by navigating the cursor over each drive and pressing **Enter** (see Figure 9). An asterisk in the left most column indicates the drive is selected. You may include from two to eight drives in the array by selecting drives from the **Available Drives** section. To include drives that are part of an existing disk array you must first delete the array.

Determining your configuration

Hint: The capacity of each drive is limited to the capacity of the smallest drive in the array. The total array capacity is defined as follows: RAID 0: (the number of drives) X (the capacity of the smallest drive) RAID 1: the capacity of the smallest drive

RAID 5: (the number of drives - 1) X (capacity of the smallest drive) RAID10: (the number of drives / 2) X (capacity of smallest drive)

Navigate to the **Create Array** button after selecting all the drives for the array. Hit **Enter** to bring up the **Create Disk Array** display (see Figure 10 and Figure 11 for examples). Check that the proper drives are listed.

Select RAID configuration

The Escalade Storage Switch gives you a choice of four RAID configurations. Select one.

- Stripe (RAID 0): maximizes performance and capacity through a process called striping. High performance arrays write portions of a single file across multiple drives. There is no fault tolerance.
- Mirror (RAID 1): duplicates or "mirrors" the data on both drives. No data will be lost if one of the drives fails.
- RAID 10: combines mirroring and striping, providing both fault tolerance and high performance. **RAID 10 arrays require a minimum of four drives.** Configurations consist of 4, 6 or 8 drives.
- RAID 5: combines parity data and striping, providing fault tolerance, high capacity and high storage efficiency. The parity data is distributed across all drives, rather than being concentrated on

a single disk, to avoid throughput loss due to corrections for the parity drive. **RAID 5 arrays requires a minimum of three drives.** Configurations consist of 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8 drives.

Select striping size

For a RAID 1 or RAID 10 configuration select the striping size. Sizes of 64K, 128K, 256K, 512K or 1M are selected using the **Stripe Size** box shown in Figure 10. RAID 5 only allows a 64K stripe size.

Select write cache properties

The Escalade Storage Switch gives you a choice of disabling the write cache for your disk arrays. Write cache is used to store data locally on the drive before it is written to the disk, allowing the computer to continue with its next task. Enabling the write cache results in the most efficient access times for your computer system.

There may be instances when you always want the computer to wait for the drive to write all the data to disk before going on to its next task. For this case, you must disable the write cache. To disable the write cache, select **disable** from the array's **Write Cache State** selection. The default for **Write Cache State** is **enable**.

Confirm array configuration

Select the **OK** button to confirm creating the array or **Cancel** to reject it. The array is not actually created and no data will be overwritten until you have finished making all your changes and select the **F8** key.

For RAID 5 Arrays

Because of the Read-Modify-Write operations, zeros are first written to all drives in the array before the array is functional. The screen shown in Figure 12 appears after selecting **OK** to confirm array creation.

If the write-zeros operation is aborted by the user for any reason the unit will go into initializing mode when restarted. This mode scans the entire array to verify parity. If coherency problems appear the parity will be corrected to match the data found on that stripe.



Caution: When running in initializing mode the array is not redundant. You cannot remove any drive.

For RAID 1 or 10 Arrays

Drives are dynamically profiled, specifically for your brand of drive, after selecting **OK** to confirm array creation. This is done to customize the stripe size (for RAID configurations offering variable striping) and seek algorithms.

Specifying a hot spare

The Escalade Storage Switch gives you the option to specify a hot spare from one of your **Available Drives.** If a hot spare is specified and the mirror degrades, an event notification will be generated. The hot spare will dynamically replace the failed drive in a mirrored array without user intervention. Select a hot spare by navigating to an **Available Drive.** The **Toggle Hot Spare** verbiage at the bottom of the screen will be black if the drive can be used as a hot spare. Enter **s** to select the hot spare or to disable the hot spare if it is already enabled.



Note: Hot spare drives need to have the same or larger storage capacity than the RAID 1, RAID 5 or RAID 10 drives.

Changing an existing configuration

- 1 Back up any disk arrays that contain data that you want to retain before the configuration change.
- 2 Create new disk arrays following the instructions in the **Deter**mining your configuration, Creating a disk array and Deleting a disk array sections. You may need to delete existing arrays to free up disks first.
- 3 Boot, partition and format any new disk arrays or free disks.
- 4 When you are finished configuring, restore from backup any data saved from previous disk arrays

Modifying a disk array

To modify an existing array you must first delete it then recreate it with the new drives. As with all disk array operations, there is no way to modify an existing array without overwriting data on the drives involved.

Deleting a disk array

To delete an array (see Figure 13) first select the array by navigating to it and hitting **Enter**. An asterisk in the left most column indicates the array is selected.



Figure 13. Delete Disk Array Display

Navigate to the **Delete Array** button and hit **Enter** to bring up the **Delete Disk Array** display. Check that the correct drives are listed. Select the **OK** key to confirm deleting the array or **Cancel** to reject it. Recall that the array is not actually deleted and no data will be overwritten until you have finished making all your changes and selected the **F8** key.

How to maintain or verify a disk array

The **Maintain Disk Array** (see Figure 14) shows the current disk array configuration that you have selected. The array's **Write Cache State** can be changed. Refer to **Select write cache properties** paragraph in the **Creating a disk array** section. **Verify Array** can be specified as **no** or **yes**. The default is **no**. **Yes** launches a foreground process that checks the data integrity of a fault tolerant array. If the verify array process determines that the mirrored drives are not identical or the parity is not correct, the mirror is degraded and the rebuild process is launched.

Rebuilding a mirrored disk array

Escalade Storage Switches allow you to create fault tolerant disk arrays by selecting a mirrored RAID 1 or RAID 10 array. These disk arrays store identical data on two or more drives to protect against drive failure. If one or more of the drives of a mirrored array is removed, unplugged or fails on read or write requests, the array is marked as **DEGRADED** and the drive is marked as **Not In Use** (see Figure 15 and Figure 16).

You can still read and write data from a degraded disk array, but the array will not be fault tolerant until it is rebuilt using the Rebuild feature, described in the *3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility* or *3DM Disk Management Utility* chapters.

Note: A RAID 10 array can be configured with either four, six or eight disks. In a 4-drive configuration, up to two drives can be rebuilt. In a 6-drive configuration, up to three drives can be rebuilt. In an 8-drive configuration, up to four drives can be rebuilt.

Rebuilding a RAID 5 disk array

Escalade Storage Switches allow you to create fault tolerant RAID 5 disk arrays. These disk arrays achieve fault tolerance by using a simple (exclusive OR) function to generate the parity data that is distributed on all drives. If one of the drives is removed, unplugged or fails on read or write requests, the array is marked as **DEGRADED** and the drive is marked as **Not In Use** (see Figure 17). When running in Degraded mode, the missing data is reconstructed from all non-degraded drives.

As in the case of RAID 1 and 10 arrays RAID 5 arrays allow you to read and write data from a degraded disk array, but the array will not be fault tolerant until it is rebuilt using the Rebuild feature. (Refer to the *3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility* or *3DM Disk Management Utility* chapters for more information.)

Rebuilding a mirrored or RAID 5 array with no hot spare

- 1 Reboot the system and enter the **Disk Array Configuration Utility**.
- 2 If your mirrored or RAID 5 array has a **Not in Use** member drive, the drive may still be usable. Try rebuilding with the **Not in Use** drive intact. Simply select the array and then the **Rebuild** button.
- 3 Confirm that you selected the correct array by hitting **OK** in the **Rebuild** confirmation display.
- 4 Select **F8** to exit the **Disk Array Configuration Utility**. The array will begin rebuilding after completion of the operating system load.
- 5 If the rebuild fails and you have no Available Drives, you must replace the drive and restart the rebuild process with the new drive. If the rebuild process fails and you have Available Drives, reboot the system and enter the Disk Array Configuration Utility.

Auto rebuild of a mirrored or RAID 5 array

If a hot spare is specified and the mirrored or RAID 5 array degrades, an event notification is generated and the hot spare dynamically replaces the failed drive in the array without user intervention. Rebuild will automatically be launched as a background process and an event notification will notify the user when the rebuild process is complete.

Auto rebuild on power failure

During driver startup 3ware's auto rebuild feature sets a flag indicating that the driver loaded. Upon an orderly shutdown the flag is rewritten, indicating a clean shutdown. During the next system power cycle the firmware queries the flag. For a RAID 1 configuration, if there was a problem, the firmware degrades the secondary drive in the array and starts the background rebuild of the mirrored drive. When the rebuild is complete the two halves of the mirror will be resynchronized. For a RAID 5 configuration, if there is a problem, the firmware starts the background verification that checks that the parity matches the data.

Compiling the Driver (For experts only)

If you wish to compile the driver yourself (for a different kernel version that you are running), then perform the following steps.

- 2 Untar the driver source with the command, tar zxfp 3wxxxx.tgz.
- 3 You must have a full Linux kernel source tree in /usr/src/linux in order to do the compile.
- 4 To build UP module boot to desired UP kernel, type: make -f makefile.oth The created file is 3w-xxxx.o
- 5 To build SMP module boot to desired SMP kernel, type: make smp -f makefile.oth The created file is 3w-xxxx.smp
- 6 Copy the module to the scsi directory.

RAID array initialization

The completion of the system driver installation will start the RAID array initialization process. This process may take several hours, but it does not interfere with the installation of 3DM or the use of the array.

Install and run 3DM disk management utility

Refer to the 3DM Disk Management Utility chapter.



3DM Disk Management Utility

The 3DM disk management utility, allows you to view status and version information about your Escalade Storage Switch. 3DM alerts you when a disk array needs maintenance and you can maintain your disk arrays from 3DM. You can add or remove drives, specify an available drive as a hot spare or launch the rebuild process. Array status can be viewed or arrays can be maintained remotely via a standard web browser provided you have access to the network containing the Escalade Storage Switch. In the Windows environment, array status can also be checked in the local popup notifier.

Event notification occurs from 3DM when the storage switch requires attention, such as when a disk array becomes degraded and is no longer fault tolerant. Event notification will only occur while 3DM is running, so we recommend that 3DM be left running as a background utility on the storage switch's machine. Event notification's e-mail feature can send an e-mail to a specified recipient when there is a problem with the array.

6 Continue with the installation as prompted. 3DM gives you the option of starting the application and opening the browser window when you complete the installation (recommended). You can run 3DM later by selecting **3DM** from the **Start** menu. To view 3DM remotely via a standard web browser, enter the URL of the system containing the Escalade Storage Switch in the address line of your browser. The default URL is http://localhost:1080/.

Linux Installation

Installing 3DM for Red Hat Linux or SuSE Linux

Note: For SuSE Linux network RPC services are required to be running, otherwise 3DM will not start.

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Note: For SuSE Linux, almost all OS packages are required to be installed for 3DM e-mail notification to function.

- 1 Insert the 3ware software installation CD-ROM for Linux into the CD-ROM drive.

You will be prompted with the a series of questions to complete the installation.

6 The next question asks if you would like to receive an e-mail message when an event occurs. The default to this question is "yes". If you enable e-mail notification you will be asked to provide the name of the mail server, the user name for the person who will send the E-mail notification (typically the local host name) and the user name for the person who will receive the e-mail notification (typically the system administrator). To enter multiple e-mail addresses, each address must be separated by a comma:

7 The next question asks if you want the popup window for event notification to beep:

8 The next question asks for the HTTP port that you would like 3DM to use. If you do not know what port to use, select the default:

9 Change the directory and then eject the CD-ROM disk when finished:

Starting 3DM

3DM should start automatically after installation and upon bootup. If you need to start 3DM manually, follow these steps:

- 1 Login as root.
- 2 Afterwards, type:

Uninstalling 3DM

To uninstall 3DM for Linux, follow these steps:

- 1 Insert the 3ware software installation CD-ROM for Linux into the CD-ROM drive.

Checking Array Status

Array status can be viewed using a web browser. Event notification occurs when the storage switch requires attention, such as when a disk array becomes degraded and is no longer fault tolerant. Event notification will only occur while 3DM is running. Therefore, 3ware recommends that 3DM be left running as background utility on the storage switch's machine. Event notification's e-mail feature can send an e-mail to a specified recipient when there is a problem with the array.



Note: The format and style of the 3DM browser windows illustrated in this chapter are examples only. The actual "look" of the windows will depend on the browser, 3DM version and operating system in use.

View status using your standard browser

Open the 3DM browser window (see Figure 50) by starting your standard web browser and entering the URL of the system where 3DM is running in the address bar of your browser. The default URL is http://localhost:1080/ or http://127.0.0.1:1080/.

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Note: For security reasons, Netscape does not allow connections to certain ports including port-1080. To override this on a per-port basis, the Netscape release notes recommend to add a comma-separated list of ports to default/all.js (in your Netscape installation directory). For example, to unblock port 1080, use the following line:

pref("network.security.ports.banned.override", "1080"). If you are using SuSE 7.3 Linux, this file is located at: /opt/defaults/netscape6/defaults/pref/all.js.

Disk arrays and independent disks are listed on the **3DM Home** display. Disks that are members of an array are indented and listed below their parent array. The type and size of the disks or arrays are listed as well as status of each array. For arrays undergoing rebuilds, the rebuild status for each drive and port is displayed, as shown in Figure 50.

The **Details** display (see Figure 51) gives storage switch version and status information in text format, which is helpful when contacting 3ware Customer Support with questions or for troubleshooting. Its text format allows you to select the text in the window with your mouse and use the system clipboard to cut and paste it into email or documentation.

Before sending an e-mail or calling 3ware Customer Service, it is a good idea to take a snapshot of the **Details** display so that you can respond to questions about your system configuration to the Customer Support representative.

The **Monitor** display (see Figure 52) is useful for overall visual status of your disk arrays. The **Monitor** display opens with either a green (all OK), orange (during array initialization or rebuild), or red (error alarm) banner. A monitor window may be opened for each system if you have multiple systems to monitor. Status for all systems can be checked at a glance by minimizing each **Monitor** display, leaving the status color indication visible.

The **Alarm** display (see Figure 53) keeps a log of all alarms, also called Automatic Event Notifications (AENs), that have occurred on the disk arrays. An alarm occurs when the storage switch requires attention, such as when a disk array becomes degraded and is no longer fault tolerant. SMART notifications appear in this display. Alarm messages are categorized by the following levels of severity:

- Errors, shown next to a red box
- Warnings, shown next to an orange box
- Information, shown next to a blue box

The **Download Error Log** button allows you to save the alarm messages and SMART data to disk. If necessary, the saved file can be shipped to 3ware Customer Support for troubleshooting assistance. A button is also provided to erase the logged data.

Password Setup

With password protection, using 3DM will require entering the password into the login display shown in Figure 55. Passwords are case sensitive. The password setup procedure is as follows:



Note: Do not select the **Enable** box in the 3DM Settings display before performing these steps.

1 Enter the current password in the **current password** box of the 3DM Settings display (see Figure 54).

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Note: If password protection is being configured for the first time, enter the factory-set default password "3ware" in the box.

- 2 Enter the new password in the **new password** box and again in the **confirm** box.
- 3 Press the **Change Password** button.

Enable/Disable Password Protection

With the 3DM password utility enabled, using 3DM will require entering the password into the login display shown in Figure 55. To enable password protection, be sure to perform the setup procedure on page 131, then select the **Enabled** option in the **Password Setup** portion of the 3DM **Settings** display (see Figure 54). To disable the utility at any time, simply return to the **Settings** window and select the **Disabled** option.

Selecting Rebuild Rate

The **3DM Settings** display allows you to choose between a faster I/ O rate or a faster Rebuild rate. Once the rate is selected, this function is only active during Rebuilds. Click on the desired rate in the **Rebuild Rate** portion of the **Settings** display (see Figure 54).

Selecting Cache Options

The **3DM Settings** display provides selection for enabling or disabling the drive's write cache. See "Select write cache properties" on page 32 for more information.

Event notification via e-mail

If an event occurs, an event notification will be e-mailed to the recipient identified in the e-mail setting specified at 3DM installation. The e-mail will contain the same information found on the Alarm display.
Mirrored Array Maintenance

From the **3DM Configure Display** (see Figure 56), you can designate an available drive as a hot spare, schedule rebuilds and media scans, or remove and add a drive as part of a hot swap procedure. To access the **Configure Display**, enter the URL of the 3DM port in the address bar of your standard web browser. You must be connected to the same network as 3DM. The default URL is http://localhost:1080/ or 127.0.0.1: 1080. Navigate to the **Configure** display. The display shows all drives attached to each 3ware controller.

Specifying a hot spare

Escalade Storage Switches give you the option to specify a hot spare from one of your available drives. Hot spares should be selected after mirror creation. Refer to *Creating a disk array* in the *3ware Disk Array Configuration Utility* chapter. To specify a hot spare after the system is booted, physically add the spare drive and click on the check box next to the available port; then click on the **Add Spare** button.

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Note: Hot spare drives must be equal to or larger than the drives used for the redundant array.

Auto rebuild of a mirrored array

If a hot spare is specified and the mirror degrades, an event notification is generated and the hot spare dynamically replaces the failed drive in a mirrored array without user intervention. Rebuild will automatically be launched as background process and an event notification will notify the user when the rebuild process is complete.

Rebuilding a redundant array with a hot swap drive

Hot swap allows a user to replace a failed drive in a redundant array while the system remains up. Hot swap can be used when 24x7 system operation is a consideration. If multiple drives are faulted in a RAID 10 configuration, you must rebuild the drives sequentially by port number starting with the lowest port number.

- 1 Click on the check box of the failed drive.
- 2 Click the **Remove Drive** button.

- 3 Physically remove the failed drive and replace it with a new drive.
- 4 Click on the check box of the new drive.
- 5 Click the **Add Drive** button.
- 6 Click on the check boxes of the members of the array to be rebuilt. This should include the new drive added in step 3.
- 7 Click the **Rebuild Array** button. The rebuild process will run in the background and an event notification will be sent when it is completed.

Selecting Force Continue

Selecting the **Force Continue on Source Errors** check box prior to rebuilding the array ensures rebuilds are not terminated if ECC errors are detected on the source disk. By default, this function is disabled.

Scheduling rebuilds and media scans

The **3DM Configuration** display allows routine maintenance of storage media by scheduling array rebuilds or initializations, array verifications, and media scans. The day, time and duration of each scheduled occurrence can be specified using pull-down menus. When finished, be sure to click on the **Save Schedule** button to confirm the entries.

The **Help** display (see Figure 57) provides direct links to 3ware's website and online help documents.

Troubleshooting: Problems and Solutions

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Note: For more troubleshooting tips and frequently asked questions, refer to 3ware's support web page at http://www.3ware.com/support.

Hardware Installation

Q1: The rail on the storage switch doesn't fit in the case.

Use a screwdriver to remove the black end rail. It aligns and secures the storage switch in the computer chassis but is not critical for operation.

Q2: My system only has two power connectors but I have four drives.

The kit includes two Y-splitter power cables. Plug them into your existing power supply lines to go from two to four power lines for your drives.

Q3: The system doesn't begin booting (no BIOS runs) when the storage switch is installed but boots OK when the switch is removed.

Check the cabling between the drives and the storage switch. A cable plugged in upside down can prevent your system from running its BIOS.

Q4: The 3ware BIOS scrolling messages never appear.

The storage switch is not installed properly. Reinstall the hardware and reboot.

Q5: Some of the drives do not appear in the Disk Array Configuration Utility's main display.

Your drives are not connected properly to the storage switch. Check that both the power and ATA cables are connected properly and that the drives are all properly jumpered. To operate properly the storage switch requires that drives be set as **Single** (if available on your drive) or **Master**.

Q6: The 3ware BIOS scrolling messages stop midway:

3ware StorSwitch 4 Storage Controller BIOS Bus A:0x00 Device #:0x70 PCI base addr:0x000010B1 units #

The storage switch is detected, but the disks may not be connected to their power source. Reconnect to their power source and reboot.

Q7: I am using a Dell Dimension system that locks-up when booting after a 3ware card is installed. What is going on?

This symptom is caused by a Dell BIOS bug. Basically, this bug sees the system boot drive as two primary master drives. That causes the system to hang. Enter the Dell BIOS setup and reload the BIOS defaults.

Software Installation

Q8: The storage switch was configured without problems, but the system does not boot.

The problem could be one or more of the following:

- The operating system is installed on a device that is not in your system's boot order. Use your system's Setup utility to include the StorSwitch controller in the boot order.
- If your operating system was installed before you configured your disk arrays, you may have overwritten your operating system. Remember that creating or deleting a disk array overwrites any existing data on the member drives. Reinstall your operating system.

• If you installed your operating system when you installed the storage switch, you may have made a mistake in installing the operating system. Reinstall your operating system.

Q9: Under Windows NT, disks show up at boot time but don't show up in Disk Administrator.

The driver has not been installed. See "Installing the storage switch on systems that boot from a different device" on page 52.

Q10: An array does not appear in the 3ware BIOS scrolling messages and shows up as incomplete in the Disk Array Configuration Utility's main display similar to the following:

```
Array Unit 1 - Incomplete 6.5 GB
Port 1 - FUJITSU MPC3065AH 6.5 GB
```

The array has some but not all of its members available. The array will be unusable. If this array is your boot device, your machine will not boot. You must either find the missing disk and replace it to complete the array, or release the member disks by deleting the incomplete array(s) listed in the display. Remember that deleting a disk array overwrites any existing data on the member drives.

Q11: Under Windows NT, disks don't appear in the Windows Explorer, but appear in the 3ware BIOS scrolling messages and appear in the Disk Array Configuration Utility's main display. Log in as the administrator. Partition and format any new disk arrays or freed disks using Disk Administrator. Choose Programs from the Start menu, followed by Administrative Tools and Disk Administrator.

Q12: The use of Red Hat's Disk Druid partitioning utility with Red Hat 6.2 or 7.0 is limited to 112 GB.

Use fdisk if more storage capacity is required.

Q13: I have created partitions over 70G but FDISK seems to think that I have a 6G partition.

Windows 98 FDISK uses 16 bit integers to store the number of megabytes for each storage device. The largest capacity it can display correctly is 65,353MB. For example, 37G in hex is 08BBA and if you stripe two drives to create a 74G partition, the lower 16 bit is 1774. Hex to decimal conversion of 1774 is 6004MB (6G).

Q14: I am experiencing problems when I try to install the storage switch with a server that has been configured with a floppybased version of Windows NT 4.0. What is going on?

Beginning with version 1.08.00.008 of the Windows NT driver, there is an additional installation step needed when installing a Escalade Storage Switch with Windows NT 4.0. If you are installing Windows NT 4.0 with the storage switch using the Windows NT 4.0 Setup diskettes, you must use a particular 3ware installation diskette, which has the 3ware driver and an install.exe program. This program installs an application, which provides shutdown notification to our controller. A limitation with the Microsoft floppy-based NT installation makes this extra step necessary.



Note: When installing Windows NT 4.0 exclusively from CD-ROM this extra step is not needed.

Follow these additional instructions:

- 1 Install Windows NT 4.0 as documented in this manual.
- 2 Go to the **Start** menu, click on **Settings** and open the **Control Panel**.
- Complete all steps including those described in the section labeled "Follow display instructions to complete Windows NT 4.0 installation" on page 50.
- 4 Perform the following steps:
 - a. Log on to Windows NT 4.0 as Administrator.
 - b. Insert the 3ware installation diskette with the install.exe program into the floppy drive.

c. Choose Start > Run from the taskbar and enter the following command: A:\INSTALL.EXE



Note: Alternatively, a command window can be opened into which you can type the command at a prompt.

- d. Follow the instructions that appear.
- e. Proceed with the instructions to "Installing 3DM for Windows NT, Windows 98/ME, Windows 2000, Windows XP" on page 118.

Q15: My driver fails to boot.

There is most likely a compatibility problem between the motherboard system BIOS and the 3ware BIOS. Check the 3ware website to see if your motherboard is compatible with the 3ware BIOS, and check with your motherboard manufacturer for potential BIOS updates.

AEN 001h SOFT_RESET

The storage switch has detected a soft reset from the device driver. Soft resets are normal at driver load and unload time. If the storage switch fails to respond to the device driver within a reasonable amount of time, the device driver may issue a soft reset to the storage switch and retry the command packet.

AEN 002h AEN_DEGRADED_UNIT

An error has been encountered and the array is operating in degraded (non-redundant) mode. The user should replace the bad drive as soon as possible and initiate a rebuild.

AEN 003h AEN_CONTROLLER_ERROR

The storage switch has encountered an internal error. Please contact 3ware customer support.

AEN 004h AEN_REBUILD_FAIL

The storage switch was unable to complete a rebuild operation. This error can be caused by drive errors on either the source or the destination of the rebuild. However, due to ATA drives ability to reallocate sectors on write errors, the rebuild failure is most likely caused by the source drive of the rebuild detecting some sort of read error. The default operation of the storage switch is to abort a rebuild if an error is encountered. If it is desired to continue on error, the **Ignore errors on rebuild** radio button can be checked prior to initiating a rebuild.

AEN 005h AEN_REBUILD_DONE

The storage switch has successfully completed a rebuild. The completion of the rebuild changes the state of the array from rebuilding to OK. The data is now redundant.

AEN 006h AEN_INCOMP_UNIT

At power on initialization time, the storage switch performs a "rollcall" of all drives attached to the card. After detection of the drives, the storage switch then uses an internal algorithm to logically connect drives that belong to the same array. If after rollcall a member of an array is not found, the **INCOMPLETE UNIT AEN** is sent. Examples of incomplete units are as follows:

- 4 drive RAID 5 with 1 drive missing.
- 2 drive RAID 1 with 1 drive missing.

Replacing the missing or dead drive and initiating a rebuild will change the state of the array from an incomplete unit to OK.

AEN 007h AEN_INIT_DONE

The storage switch has completed the initialization sequence and performs the initialization step at array creation time of RAID levels 1, 10 and 5. For RAID 5, the data on the array is read and the resultant parity is written to the parity area on the array. For RAID 1 and 10, one half of the mirror is copied to the other half (mirrors are synchronized).

AEN 008h AEN_UNCLEAN_SHUTDOWN

The storage switch has the ability to detect if the system has been shutdown via the standard shutdown mechanism of the operating system (clean shutdown). If the system loses power or is reset without going through the normal shutdown procedure, it is possible that the data on a redundant array may be out of synchronization. The unclean shutdown detection will detect this case and force the array to enter the rebuilding state. This has the effect of synchronizing the array back to a fully redundant state.

To prevent unclean shutdowns, the user should always go through the normal shutdown procedure for the operating system in use and use an uninterruptible power supply (UPS) to prevent unclean shutdowns due to sudden power loss.

AEN 009h AEN_APORT_TIMEOUT

The storage switch has a sophisticated recovery mechanism to handle various types of failures of a disk drive. One such possible failure of a disk drive is a failure of a command that is pending from the storage switch to complete within a reasonable amount of time. If the storage switch detects this condition, it notifies the user, prior to entering the recovery phase, by displaying this AEN. Possible causes of APORT time-outs include a bad or intermittent disk drive, power cable or ATA interface cable.

AEN 00Ah AEN_DRIVE_ERROR

As part of the recovery mechanism of the storage switch, various drive failures can be detected and if possible corrected. One such drive failure is when the drive indicates back to the storage switch that it was unable to complete a command. If the drive returns an error to the storage switch, the user is notified by this AEN.

AEN 00Bh AEN_REBUILD_STARTED

The storage switch notifies the user whenever it starts a rebuild. The rebuild start may be user initiated (by selecting the rebuild button in the 3DM Disk Management Utility) or it may be auto initiated by a hot spare failover. In either case, the user is notified of the event by this AEN.

AEN 00Ch AEN_INIT_STARTED

The storage switch notifies the user by this AEN whenever it starts an Initialization. Initialization occurs at array creation time.

AEN 00Fh AEN_SMART_FAIL

The storage switch supports SMART Monitoring. whereby the individual drives automatically monitor certain parametric information such as error rates and retry counts. By monitoring this data, SMART may be able to predict a drive failure before it happens, allowing a user to schedule service of the array before it becomes degraded. The SMART status of each drive attached to the storage switch is monitored daily. If a failure of any drive is determined to be likely, the user is notified by this AEN.

AEN 021h AEN_UDMA_DOWNGRADE

The storage switch communicates to the ATA disk drives through the Ultra DMA (UDMA) protocol. This protocol ensures data integrity across the ATA cable by appending a Cyclical Redundancy Check (CRC) for all ATA data that is transferred. If the data becomes corrupted between the drive and the storage switch (e.g., an intermittent cable connection) the storage switch detects this as a UDMA CRC or cable error. The storage switch then retries the failed command three times at the current UDMA transfer rate. If the error persists, it lowers the UDMA transfer rate (e.g., from UDMA 100 to UDMA 66) and retries another three times. This AEN is sent to the user when the storage switch lowers the UDMA transfer rate.

Possible causes of UDMA CRC errors are intermittent or bad ATA interface cables or cable routing problems through electrically noisy environments (e.g., cables are too close to the power supply).

AEN 023h AEN_SECTOR_REPAIR

The storage switch supports a feature called dynamic sector repair to allow the unit to recover from certain drive errors that would normally result in a degraded array situation. For redundant arrays such as RAID 1, 10 and 5, the storage switch essentially has two copies of the users data available. If a read command to a sector on a disk drive results in an error, it reverts to the redundant copy in order to satisfy the host's request. At this point, the storage switch has a good copy of the requested data in its cache memory. It will then use this data to force the failing drive to reallocate the bad sector, which essentially repairs the sector. When a sector repair occurs, the user is notified by this AEN.

The fact that a sector repair AEN has been sent to the user is an indication of the presence of grown defects on a particular drive. While typical modern disk drives are designed to allow several hundred grown defects, special attention should be paid to any drive in an array that begins to indicate sector repair messages. This may be an indication of a drive that is beginning to fail. The user may wish to replace the drive, especially if the number of sector repair errors exceeds 3 per month.

AEN 024h AEN_SBUF_FAIL

The storage switch, as part of its data integrity features, performs diagnostics on its internal RAM devices. Once a day, a non-destructive test is performed on the cache memory. Failure of the test indicates a failure of a hardware component on the storage switch. This AEN is sent to notify the user of the problem.

AEN 025h AEN_LOST_CACHED_WRITE

To improve performance, this storage switch features caching layer firmware. For write commands this means that it acknowledges it has completed a write operation before the data is committed to disk. If the storage switch can not commit the data to the media after it has acknowledged to the host, this AEN is posted to the user.

Typically, the LOST CACHED WRITE notification would be an indication of a catastrophic failure of the drives in the array, such as loss of power to multiple drives in an array.

AEN 026h AEN_DRIVE_ECC_ERROR

This AEN may be sent when a drive returns the ECC error response to a storage switch command. The AEN may or may not be associated with a host command. Internal operations such as Background Media Scan post this AEN whenever drive ECC errors are detected.

Drive ECC errors are an indication of a problem with grown defects on a particular drive. For redundant arrays, this typically means that dynamic sector repair would be invoked (see AEN 023h). For nonredundant arrays (JBOD, RAID0 and degraded arrays), drive ECC errors result in the storage switch returning failed status to the associated host command.

AEN 027h AEN_DCB_XSUM_ERROR

The storage switch stores certain configuration parameters on a reserved area of each disk drive called the Drive Configuration Block (DCB). As part of power-on initialization, the storage switch

performs a checksum of the DCB area to ensure consistency. If an error occurs, please contact 3ware technical support. The drive's DCB has been corrupted.

AEN 028h AEN_DCB_BAD_VERSION

During the evolution of the Escalade product line, the format of the DCB has been changed to accommodate new features. The DCB format expected by the storage switch and the DCB that is written on the drive must be compatible. If an array that was created on a very old Escalade product is connected to a newer Escalade storage switch, this AEN is posted and the storage switch rejects the drive. Please contact 3ware technical support if this event occurs.

AEN 029h AEN_VERIFY_STARTED

The storage switch allows the user to verify data integrity on an array. The verification functions for different RAID levels are as follows:

- JBOD. Verify = Media Scan
- RAID 0. Verify = Media Scan
- RAID 1. Verify = Compare of Mirror Sides
- RAID 10. Verify = Compare of Mirror Sides
- RAID 5. Verify = Parity Data = User Data

When the verification starts, this AEN is posted to the user.

AEN 02Ah AEN_VERIFY_FAILED

This AEN indicates that the data integrity verification function (see AEN 029h) has terminated with an error. For each RAID level being verified, this may mean:

- JBOD. A single drive returned an error, possibly because of a media defect.
- RAID 0. A single drive returned an error, possibly because of a media defect.
- RAID 1. One side of the mirror does not equal the other side.

- RAID 10. One side of the mirror does not equal the other side.
- RAID 5. The parity data does not equal the user data.

For JBOD and RAID0, the most likely cause of the error is a grown defect in the drive. For out-of-synchronization mirrors, the error could be caused by improper shutdown of the array. This possibility applies to RAID 1, 10 and 5. A rebuild will re-synchronize the array.

AEN 02Bh AEN_VERIFY_DONE

This AEN indicates the data integrity verification function (see AEN 029h) was completed successfully. No errors were encountered.

AEN 02Ch AEN_SECTOR_OVERWRITE

If a read error is encountered during a rebuild and the user chooses to ignore the error, the sector in error is reallocated. The user is notified of the event by this AEN.

AEN 02Dh AEN_RBLD_SOURCE_ERROR

If an error is encountered during a rebuild operation, this AEN is generated if the error was on a source drive of the rebuild. Knowing if the error occurred on the source or the destination of the rebuild is useful for troubleshooting.

AEN 0FFh AEN_QUEUE_FULL

This is an internal error. Please 3ware contact technical support.
